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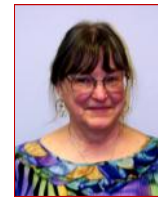

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings IGS Members & Friends,

This fall is shaping up to be a happening time. We are in the planning and preparation stage for adding indexes to the website to enable researchers to search for and order copies of documents and obituaries. More hands, talents and time are needed to effect these upgrades, not just to the website, but to our membership database and a non-member database. If you have IT experience in programming or database management please volunteer your talents and time to an IGS IT group.

1983 microfilms of obituaries are deteriorating and if they are scanned from the microfilm to a digital database and indexed, those obituaries will become more accessible, not only in the library, but by researchers anywhere in the world. Undertaking this project also provides revenue for the Society via the Internet. Manpower is needed to complete the project and volunteers needed to process the orders. Records indexed will include material where the original documents to be copied (and scanned into a database at IGS) are in the archives at the Iowa Historical Library.

One of the goals identified by the strategy group is marketing our Society to members, potential members and other stakeholders. In other words getting ourselves known as having a "brand" and being a good place for genealogy research. We want to share what works with county chapters and provide links to their websites for Internet researchers. Iowa has been a crossroad historically and we want to advertise the opportunities for genealogy research in Iowa including cooperating with the county pages on the USGENWEB. The need for a marketing group or committee has been identified as a goal by the strategy meetings. If marketing is your talent or passion please volunteer to become part of this project.

IGS Announces Completion of 1940 Census Index

The indexing of the 1940 census of Iowa has been completed; the index and corresponding images are available online for free to the public. Members of the Iowa Genealogical Society headed the all-volunteer indexing project for the state as part of a small army of indexers organized by FamilySearch.org. In just over two months, the entire population of 1.5 million Iowans was in effect indexed twice, with every name being viewed and entered by two separate volunteers to insure accuracy.

The Iowa Genealogical Society ranks fifth in the nation among large groups involved in this project, and its sixty-three volunteers had a ninety-eight percent accuracy rate, the highest of all the participating societies. Barbara Hammer, group administrator for the society's indexing efforts, points out that "the four leaders are from more densely populated areas like California and Michigan which makes me feel proud of IGS for keeping up with the 'big boys'."

For the first time, images of an entire national census will be available online without charge to the public at several websites, including FamilySearch.org. When we teach beginning genealogy classes at our library, we tell people that they need to find their ancestors in every census record that existed during their lifetime. Censuses are among the basic building blocks in family history research – they reveal amazing pieces of information, from places of birth, citizenship status, income or in the case of 1940, whether a family member worked for the CCC or WPA earlier in the year.

The effort was not without its challenges. Volunteers indexed a total of 451,046 records and logged nearly 5500 hours, struggling with indecipherable handwriting and unfamiliar ethnic names. One indexer laughed and vowed that after her experience of trying to read a census enumerator's handwriting, she "would never, ever complain about someone else's indexing."

Virginia Public Claims Volumes Donated to IGS Library

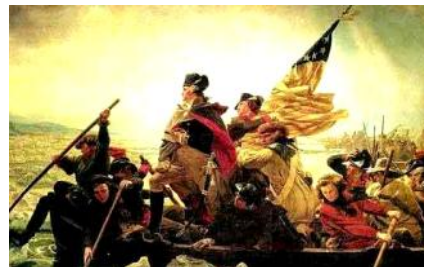
The Daughters of the American Revolution has presented the Iowa Genealogical Society Library with a three-volume set of the Virginia Revolutionary "Publick" Claims.

The Public Claims are the records of supplies given and services rendered, for the purpose of carrying on the Revolutionary War. Before there was a government, the citizens had to supply all the needs of the troops with food, clothing, logistics, etc.

The Virginia Legislature in May 1780 passed "An act for procuring a supply of provisions and other necessaries for the use of the Army." The Act, for procuring a supply of provisions and other necessaries for the use of the Army," provided, "with utmost expedition, large stores of provisions, either to supply our own militia, Continental troops, or for supplying the troops sent by our good allies to the assistance of the United States."

In return for supplies requisitioned on behalf of the militia, the civilian population was issued certificates, or warrants, to be redeemed in either continental or state funds. A warrant is an order, or promissory note, for the money value of supplies given, or services rendered, as recorded in the Public Claims.

Warrants for the Revolutionary period may be compared to the Liberty Bonds of the World War; for without the services and supplies represented by these Public Claims, victory for the Continentals would have been impossible. Indexes of Revolutionary Public Claims are valuable because they contain names of patriots whose services to their country are recorded in no other place save in these manuscripts in the archives of the Virginia State Library.

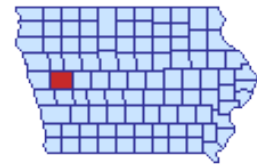

About a year ago the **Crawford County Genealogical Society** was asked by the Oakland Cemetery Association at Denison, Iowa, to assist them in building a gazebo at the cemetery. The gazebo would display the names and locations of all the burials in the cemetery.



The cemetery has about 4000 burials from the early days of the community to the present and is considered a Pioneer Cemetery. One special site at the cemetery is the mausoleum of Leslie Shaw. The seventeenth governor of Iowa between 1898 and 1902, Leslie Shaw also served as United States Secretary of the Treasury from 1902 to 1907.

Two members of our society volunteered to assist them. The cemetery records were on a card file and record books, some over a hundred years old. First all the records were computerized; this combined all the information in one easy-to-read file that could be readily updated for future burials. The cemetery was walked to verify the written records, then an alphabetized list of burials and their locations were put in display panels in the gazebo. The volunteers spent many hours on the project. It was a very rewarding project and was completed by Memorial Day this year. Now visitors can locate a specific grave without having to search the entire cemetery.

Library Grant Preserves Muscatine History *By Mike Ferguson, Muscatine Journal Reporter*

Lynn McCleary and other members of the **Muscatine County Genealogical Society** aren't about to permit a brittle celluloid connection to Muscatine's past to snap.

Hence the group's \$2,200 grant to the Musser Public Library — a gift that paid for replacing the library's forty-four oldest spools of Muscatine Journal microfilm, which dates back to the newspaper's founding in 1840.

"People have a passion for learning about family history," McCleary said Tuesday during a visit to the library, "and we're passionate about preserving Muscatine history."

Microfilm, which is stored on spools that contain page after page of historical documents, is more prone to tear as it ages, said Bobby Fiedler, the library's assistant director.

"The microfilm is used a lot, and that's when it starts to tear," McCleary said. "Our concern is one day it will no longer be usable. It is a precious thing to have preserved."

That won't be a problem moving forward. Since 2010, the Journal has provided the library with a digital version of every page of each month's newspaper — searchable by keyword.

In theory, those compact discs will last forever. But for history before 2010, the library owns two machines that can scan microfilm, find the needed article or photograph, then snap a digital image of what's needed, sending the image to a printer or a flash drive.

According to McCleary, the Society raises most of its money by selling copies of old Muscatine County Court probate records, which court officials don't have storage capacity to keep.

Members of the Genealogical Society sorted and indexed the records — some 150 years old — and were given permission to sell the documents to interested family members.

Members have also volunteered to index the Journal's birth, marriage and death records. The volunteers are particularly helpful to library patrons, Fiedler said, when they employ their research skills to find answers to people's local history questions when library staff doesn't have time — or are themselves stumped.

"They're really good," Fiedler said of the volunteers. "They have the time and the know-how to get it done. They're a partner, and a really valuable one."

"People are passionate about [having access to] genealogical services," Fiedler added. "Of all the services we provide, those people are the most vocal proponents, and they're really good at providing feedback. I have never heard a negative comment."

McCleary cited this recent example of how her group works with library staff: she received an email forwarded to her by a staffer from a Frenchman who wanted to contact the surviving family members of a military man from Muscatine killed during World War II while fighting to liberate the man's village.

Hidden Treasures

Only one treasure is being highlighted this month, and that is the entire periodical section of the library. Recently, the entire area was rearranged to make better use of the space. The area starts in the southeast corner with general magazines, such as *Ancestry*, *Family Chronicle*, *Family Tree* followed by national society publications like *Mayflower Quarterly* and *National Genealogical Society Quarterly*. The next small area is for regional societies of the Midwest, Illiana and Ark-La-Tex. The U.S. states follow alphabetically. Finally, you will find the international publications of the British Isles through Sweden.

Within each U.S. state, the arrangement is as follows: state societies, regional (i.e. central, eastern), and then the counties in alphabetical order. Signs have been put up to aid your search. Re-labeling of boxes will be an on-going project.

We hope this will be helpful to our patrons.

McCleary was able to find a surviving niece and nephew — one in Oregon, the other in Illinois — but neither wished to be contacted by the man from France, who is working to build a small World War II museum and wished to use information on the Muscatine liberator.

"He was crushed," McCleary said, "but we had to respect their wishes."

She said she's not sure what the Genealogical Society will do for an encore following its most recent gift.

"It took us quite a long time to raise the \$2,200," she said. "But we'll think of something."

MAKING CONNECTIONS WITH IGS: Somewhere In Time

I recently joined the Iowa Genealogical Society and was anxiously anticipating my first newsletter. It arrived! As I read an article describing the “Somewhere In Time” wedding dress display, I knew I’d found something that could honor my parents’ (Delmar and Margaret Beye Tigges) approaching sixty-fifth June wedding anniversary. I didn’t once consider it might be an opportunity to connect with other relatives.

I asked my mother if it would be acceptable to use her wedding suit in the display. She agreed and mentioned she had her mother’s wedding dress and her father’s wedding shirt if I wanted to include those, too. I interviewed her and my father about the particulars of their courtship and marriage and learned enough to complete the application form for the display.

While I was waiting to see if I would be approved, my parents and I spent time looking through their scrapbooks, photo albums, and bridal book. I discovered new things about this time in their life: my father proposed in his car after a basketball game, the engagement ring was purchased with money from furs he sold trapping on the farm, they helped each other select their wedding attire, and a thunderstorm knocked out electricity in the church just before the service began.

My mother didn’t know any details about the courtship, engagement, or wedding of her parents, Russell and Merle Groff Beye, who were married 29 October 1912, nearly one hundred years ago. I began searching through boxes of items from an aunt. I was thrilled to discover two original newspaper articles about a wedding shower and the wedding itself. I was amazed to find the handwritten shower invitation and hand-written rhymes from the kitchenware shower. They were much more creative and personalized than the cards typically purchased today. I also located several photos of my grandparents in their early years that I didn’t know existed.

Because many items were fragile, I scanned invitations, photos and rhymes and began to assemble items for the display. It was great fun to prepare, and even greater fun to see what others had brought. I would strongly encourage others to get involved in any IGS special projects.

When the event ended and I arrived to take down my display, one of the volunteers told me that a person who had attended said her husband was my relative. Since my family originated in Marshall County, I couldn’t imagine who it might be. A few days later I received a phone call from Rees Jones, a second cousin on my father’s side. His wife had visited the display and recognized the Tigges family name. Looking through my mother’s bridal book, she saw Rees had signed a guest page in his best ten-year-old handwriting! In the past our families had been in touch with each other, but that connection had gradually been lost.

We had a lovely conversation about our families and the Tigges history. He shared his work on the family genealogy and we compared notes. I brought him up-to-date on the whereabouts of my parents and siblings; and I let him know that the red hair his mother had was being passed on through my sister to her daughter who just graduated from high school. It’s a small world after all!

2012 IGS HERITAGE QUILT SHOW UPDATE: Dating Quilts With Names

Everyone is invited to attend the 2012 IGS Heritage Quilt Show: **“What’s In a Name and Other Quilt Tales,”** October 12 - 13, 19 - 20. The exhibit will be open daily, 10 a.m. - 4 p.m., in the West Wing of the IGS Library. **Special group tours are available.** Contact IGS for details.

This year’s focus is quilts that have had names incorporated into them. The earliest quilts with names were done in a fine cross stitch, followed by names either penned in ink or stenciled in ink. Next were quilts where the name was embroidered and were often referred to as signature quilts, friendship quilts, and/or memory quilts. In the 21st century we find computerized sewing machines that do this for the quilter.

The styles used when names are incorporated can help you determine the era in which your quilt may have been made. This information is often lost when quilts are passed down to the next generation. From a genealogical perspective, there are often many family members included in a single quilt; these can help solve family mysteries.

There are other items where names are included: such as clothing, linens, samplers, or personal items, i.e., letter pockets, needle/sewing kits, and other “tokens of affection.”

The other emphasis of this year’s exhibit will be Civil War Quilts, either from that era or current quilts made with reproduction fabric in traditional Civil War era patterns. Examples of these types of quilts will be on display. We will work to display Civil War related quilts collectively.

We look forward to ANY and ALL quilts for this year’s show, but will try and group those with names on them as a collection. We will have books on display at the show to help date and identify your quilt.

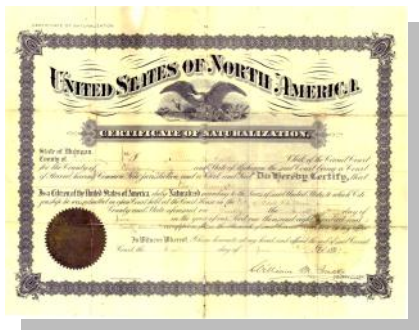

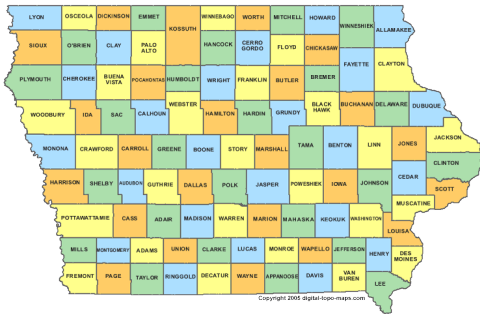
