#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE By Kevin Spire, IGS President

Preserving the Past, Enriching the Future

Have you looked at our logo for the Iowa Genealogical Society lately? Did you know we had a logo? If you need a reminder, I encourage you to take a closer look at the image and the inscription that surrounds it, which reads: "*Preserving The Past, Enriching The Future*". What does that mean to you?

Each one of us is *Preserving the Past* as we research and record the events of our ancestor's lives using various records, maps, letters, photos, etc. These artifacts are all pieces of a larger puzzle to explain the story of our ancestor's experience. In my mind, I see a movie that unfolds before me. How do you experience the story you discover?

In your present life, each of us has experienced many hopes, dreams, joys and tragedies; it's something we all share as a part of the human experience. So, why wouldn't your ancestor's experience be the same? Your abilities as a genealogist allow you to research different artifacts and put those puzzle pieces together in a manner that creates the story of their life experience. This is a unique skill like no other that allows you to Preserve the Past.

Now take a look at the second part of the phrase: *Enriching the Future*. What does this mean to you? Well, I have another question for you, what are you doing with all the information you are collecting about your ancestors? We all spend countless hours on this activity. If you were being paid by an employer for your research time, how much money would they have paid you so far? And add on top of that the cost of software, books, website memberships, trips to a cemetery, etc. It all adds up to a big investment. So, why wouldn't you want to ensure your work lives on beyond you, by sharing it with others? This is one way to ensure it lives on for the future.

I heard a great phrase the other day made to a group of genealogists, "remember to spend some time with the living". Share what you've learned with others. Start with family members, since you all share a common ancestor line. Put it in words and terms THEY understand and stay away from research details about columns on census records or details about DNA matching. People want something they can connect to, so talk with them at their level of interest. With younger generations, talk about the adventures and struggles an ancestor may have experienced with crossing of the Atlantic Ocean, or what it must have been like for an earlier settler in Iowa, struggling with the necessities of life. For adult generations, you might talk about some of the political or economic events that pushed an ancestor to travel to the USA.

The point here is to find a way to share the work you've done. Get others excited and encourage their involvement. After all, it's all about family and how each of us came to the place that we are today. This is how I see genealogy being a part of the past, the present and the future.

## Federal Military Records 1775 – 1900: Compiled Military Service Records

Following the Civil War, the federal government compiled records for military volunteers and draftees, including militia troops and state soldiers federalized for national service. Using muster rolls, hospital records, and unit documents, the goal was to provide proof for veterans seeking military pensions. Compiled Military Service Records (CMSR), available for the Revolutionary War through the Philippine Insurrection, are comprised of carded abstracts and occasionally loose papers. They are bundled in envelopes and filed by the soldier's name. CMSRs document your soldier's service from the time of enlistment to the date of discharge. The National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) preserves these early military records.

#### Find your soldier

Name indexes for the various wars are available on NARA microfilm. Online databases make searching for your soldier easier. Ancestry.com, Fold3.com, and FamilySearch have digitized microfilmed indexes. The Patterson Hoit CMSR: jacket cover and an enclosed National Park Service Soldiers and Sailors Database



(https://www.nps.gov/civilwar/soldiers-and-sailors-database.htm ) can help identify your Civil War ancestor. If your ancestor served in more than one company or re-enlisted into another unit, he may have more than one CMSR.

Once you locate your soldier in an index, order his CMSR from the National Archives. Some carded records have been digitized, but to be certain you have the complete packet, order directly from NARA: https:// www.archives.gov/veterans/military-service-records/pre-ww-1-records

#### **Limitations to CMSRs**

CMSRs were not compiled for "Regular Army" personnel or other enlisted service branches. See Trevor K. Plante, "An Overview of Records at the National Archives Relating to Military Service," *Proloque*, Fall 2002, vol. 34, no. 3 (https://www.archives.gov/publications/prologue/2002/fall/military-records-overview.html) for a discussion of enlisted military research options.

If your ancestor was part of militia that did not serve at the federal level, no CMSR was created. State archives are the place to search for colonial or state-level service.

#### What might your learn?

CMSRs for the early wars often provide only basic information: rank, unit, state from which served, and in some cases, term of service. Later wars include age, birthplace, and sometimes a physical description. Although genealogical information is limited, this is a good first step in documenting your ancestor's military experience.

With careful study, you can glean clues to additional sources

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such as pension files, medical records, official correspondence, and land grants. If your soldier was captured, wounded, deserted, or court-martialed, you'll find evidence in his CMSR. Use what you learn to dig deeper.

#### **Example: Patterson Hoit, Civil War Volunteer**

Here is what I found in Civil War soldier Patteron Hoit's CMSR:

- The jacket cover (illustration, left) lists cards and other materials bundled within the envelope. Patterson's CMSR includes seven loose papers, mostly regarding his time as a prisoner of war.
- At the bottom of the jacket cover and the sample card (illustration, right), is a "bookmark" notation—Claim 11. This is a cross-reference to another record; in this case, a clothing requisition. Bookmarks always indicate "something more" to investigate.
- Patterson was a private in Company F, 18<sup>th</sup> lowa Volunteer Infantry.
- He was nineteen at the time of his enlistment on 7 July 1862 in Clinton, lowa (ages should be confirmed against non-military records). He enlisted for a term of three years.
- He's described as five feet five inches tall, light complexion, with grey eyes and red hair.
- He was in battles at Newtonia, Missouri;
   Springfield, Missouri; Cross Timbers, Arkansas;
   and Prairie De Ann, Arkansas.
- His "military character" was described as "good."
- He was taken prisoner near Poison Springs, Arkansas, on 17 April 1864 and released 25 February 1865.
- After his release, he received hospital treatment and new clothing. He signed for the clothing requisition with "his mark."
   Patterson was discharged from service at

Davenport, Iowa, on 30 June 1865.

Certain records misidentify Patterson as

"Harrison Hoyt." This could be significant in future searches.

With this abundance of information, I can take my research to the next level—pension files, prisoner of war records, hospital files, and military correspondence. I will explore the history of the 18<sup>th</sup> lowa and its involvement in the battles mentioned. There are plenty of resources to learn more about Patterson Hoit's Civil War experience.
