

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE By Kevin Spire, IGS President

Immigration: Another Example Where History Repeats Itself

This year, we've seen the news coverage of immigrating families being detained at the USA and Mexico border. The news stories create strong reactions from many regarding how family members are being treated: children separated from parents, families being divided, etc. Seeing the photos and hearing the stories invoke a strong emotional response from many. And some might wonder how this could be happening in a place as civilized at the United States of America? Yet, if you look into our own history, you'll find a rather "checkered" past regarding how immigrants have been treated upon their arrival to our country.

A recent class at the Iowa Genealogical Society presented by our own Theresa Liewer took a closer look at the topic of immigration. While she identified the type of information found in a number of documents, she also led the class to discuss our government's motivation behind the information that was being collected. Motivating factors like wars, economic trends and social issues were just some of the contributing factors.

Immigration controls, like we're seeing today, are not new to our country. One such ban occurred under the Immigration Act of 1917. This law banned immigrants from the Asiatic Barred Zone, a new, massive region that included Saudi Arabia, most of China, Afghanistan, Pakistan, India, Malaysia, Thailand and Indonesia. This is just one example in America's dark history that also includes the battles against Native Americans and the enslavement of African-Americans. Our history also has periods of anti-Catholicism focused on the Irish and the Germans and periods of anti-Semitism. While not pleasant to think about, it is a part of our past.

Just imagine what it must have been like for your ancestors as they approached Ellis Island. Maybe alone or with their family and the minimal possessions carried for the voyage. They've left everything else behind in a place they used to call home. They've decided to take a gamble on starting a new life in a strange land with a different language. And then the moment arrives where their entire destiny lies with that immigration official at the front of the line. What if they were denied entry? What would they do and where would they go?

As a researcher, this topic is something you can factor into your own ancestor's story. Give some consideration to what was going on in the USA at the time your ancestor arrived to this country. I can barely image the stress and emotional anxiety it can play on a person and their family members. It might influence some choice on where they lived, how they traveled or with whom they associated (remember the FAN club?). Looking into these understandings could reveal an overlooked key to your research. Possibly crack a brick wall?

We've all heard the adage: History Repeats Itself. And our current media might be providing a window to that very thing. Keep your eyes and ears open to what is being covered in the news today and then give some thought to, "did something similar happen in the past?" It could provide insight to understanding your ancestors or a new-found appreciation of their actions.



On Saturday, September 29, a group tour in and around Winterset will provide you an opportunity to visit three of our preserved and furnished country schools — one each made of logs, stone, and frame. Ancestry.com Interest Group meets the second Sunday of the month, from 1:30 p.m. - 3:30 p.m.


